

CHAPTER I

1.1 Background of the Study

In early 2000s America, the nature of social capital undergoes significant changes. Participation in community organizations declines, leading to a reduced trust in institutions and a weaker engagement in civic activities. However, personal relationships within small communities and peer networks remain vital sources of support, especially for individuals from disadvantaged backgrounds. Nevertheless, access to social capital is not evenly distributed, as socioeconomic status influences one's ability to form beneficial social connections (Putnam, 2005:11). These shifts indicate that while traditional forms of social capital diminish, interpersonal relationships continue to play a crucial role in providing an emotional and economic support.

The concept of social capital is also reflected in a movie entitled *A Cinderella Story* (2004), a modern adaptation of the classic Cinderella tale. The movie follows Sam Montgomery, a hardworking teenager who dreams of attending Princeton University but faces numerous challenges after her father's death. She is mistreated by her stepmother, Fiona, and stepsisters, who constantly undermine her. Despite her struggles, Sam finds support through meaningful social connections, including her best friend Carter and her mentor Rhonda, who provide her with encouragement

and guidance. Additionally, her bond with Austin Ames, a popular yet conflicted student, helps her realize her self-worth and stand up for herself. This narrative illustrates how strong social networks help individuals overcome adversity and achieve personal growth.

This research thesis explores how *A Cinderella Story* (2004) movie portrays social capital as a key factor in Sam Montgomery's journey. The reason for conducting this research is the writer's personal interest in how social relationships shape an individual's opportunities and development. This movie has been one of favorites movies that strongly highlights the role of social capital in shaping the main character's life. The relationships she builds with her friends, coworkers, and mentors significantly impact her journey, making this movie an interesting subject for analysis. Moreover, the writer is exploring how social capital functions in real life, especially in helping individuals navigate challenges and achieve their goals. 1.5 Previous Studies

The first previous study reviews is an undergraduate thesis written by Mauliza Annisa from Universitas Sumatera Utara, entitled *An Analysis of Women Empowerment in the Movie Cinderella* (2021). This thesis examines how the 2021 adaptation of Cinderella portrays the empowerment of its female protagonist. Annisa's research focuses on the movie's representation of gender roles and independence, particularly analyzing how Cinderella breaks free from traditional

expectations and societal constraints. This thesis uses feminist theory to explore the character's journey toward self-reliance and agency.

The second previous study that the writer reviews is an undergraduate thesis written by Muhammad Nif'an Fatahillah from Universitas Brawijaya (2019), entitled *Representation of Social Issues in Siti and Turah Movie: A Study of Pierre Bourdieu's Social Practice and Symbolic Violence*. This thesis analyzes the portrayal of social issues in the Indonesian movie *Siti and Turah*, using Pierre Bourdieu's theory of social practice and symbolic violence. It highlights the struggles of lower-class individuals, exploring themes of poverty, oppression, and social hierarchy. This thesis emphasizes how social structures perpetuate inequality and limit upward mobility.

The third previous study that the writer reviews is an undergraduate thesis written by Okania Mentari from Universitas Batanghari (2019), entitled *Personality Traits: Analysis of Main Character in Cinderella Movie 2015 by Disney*. This thesis analyzes the personality traits of the main character in *Cinderella* (2015) by using the Big Five Personality Traits theory. Mentari's thesis focuses on how Cinderella's characteristics—such as agreeableness, openness, and conscientiousness—affect her behavior and interactions with other characters.

The differences between this research thesis and the three previous studies are that this research thesis specifically focuses on how *A Cinderella Story* (2004) illustrates the role of social capital in shaping the protagonist's opportunities and success through the framework of social capital. This research thesis will provide a

new perspective on how relationships and support systems influence an individual's ability to achieve their goals.

1.6 Research Method

1.6.1 Method of Data Collection

In writing this research thesis, the writer uses library research to gather the data. Library research involves various sources that contain information related to the subject of a study (George, 2018:6). This method incorporates both primary and secondary data. Primary data as original research or firsthand accounts of events and experiences. It refers to information obtained directly from sources such as surveys, interviews, experiments, or observations, which has not been previously published or analyzed by others (George, 2018:73). In this research thesis, primary data is gathered through a close analysis of *A Cinderella Story* (2004), focusing on the dialogues and scenes from the movie.

In addition, secondary data refers to information that has been collected, analyzed, and interpreted by others (George, 2018:73). Secondary data typically consists of sources such as books, journal articles, research papers, and other academic documents that provide a second-hand analysis of primary data. In this research thesis, the secondary data is gathered from books, journal articles, and research papers that provides analyses and perspectives relevant to the themes and issues examined in *A Cinderella Story* (2004). Overall, the combination of primary and secondary data allows the writer to conduct a thorough analysis of *A Cinderella Story* (2004) by providing diverse perspectives and critical insights into the role of social capital in shaping the protagonist's journey.

1.6.2 Research Approach
