Lastly, the analysis unveils the profound impact of these social perceptions on Cole Phelps, leading to moments of self-doubt regarding his war hero status, motivating him to tackle specific cases like the arson investigation, forcing him to confront guilt associated with his extramarital affair, pushing him to acknowledge his difficulty with receiving praise, prompting shifts in his opinions, and instilling in him the drive to pursue career advancement within the LAPD. This comprehensive exploration reveals the intricate interplay between social perception and character development in shaping the trajectory of Cole Phelps' journey in *L.A. Noire*.
