CHAPTER IV

CONCLUSION

This research aims to determine whether or not Napoleon's abuse of power can be described using transitivity system. The results of the research conducted show that material and verbal processes were the two most prominent methods used by Napoleon in exercising his power. The material process was the most commonly used with 72 quantities, followed by verbal process with 67 quantities, behavioural process with 30 quantities, relational process with 21 quantities, and mental process with the least quantities of only 17. This data indicates that Napoleon relied heavily on his actions and words to demonstrate his authority and influence the people around him. Through his actions and words, Napoleon managed to influence people and convince them to follow his orders while ensuring that his power was recognized and respected.

I find that Napoleon uses a variety of material and verbal processes to maintain his leadership on the farm. He employs a material process, which is evident through words such as "abolishing," "arranging," and "inflicting," which demonstrate how Napoleon makes decisions, changes, and uses force within the farm. Additionally, he uses a verbal process which is seen through words like "announced," "said," and "decreed" to threaten and intimidate the other animals in order to keep them under his control.

In many clauses, the narrator also added circumstantial elements to provide additional context and information about the action being described, such as when

the action occurred, where the action happened, and how the action was performed, just no name a few. This additional information can help understand the action and its consequences in a given context.

In conclusion, Napoleon's abuse of power is a direct result of his insatiable hunger for absolute control. He is willing to do anything to maintain his power, including manipulating the other animals and creating a dictatorship with himself as the leader. Through his lies and manipulation, Napoleon is able to convince the animals of Animal Farm that he is the only one who can lead them to a better future.
