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### **ABSTRACT**

Non-standard English (NSE) and standard English (SE) are parts of language variety. SE is privileged and usually used by the upper-class, while NSE is typically acquired from home and is usually used by the lower class. Language variety, including SE and NSE, is not only present in verbal communications but also in novels. The aims of this study are to (1) identify the NSE and SE used in The Secret Garden (1911) novel, (2) describe the characters' motives on using NSE, and (3) describe the characters' motives on using SE. This study focuses on the utterances of Mary, Colin, Archibald Craven, Mrs. Medlock, Martha, Dickon, and Ben Weatherstaff, which represent different social classes. The data in this study were collected from *The Secret Garden* (1911) e-book. This study uses the descriptive qualitative method and purposive sampling technique, analysed using the theories of Holmes (2013), Azzar (1993), Freeborn (1995), and Saunders (1990). The results of the study show that NSE includes different grammatical and vocabulary features in comparison to SE. Lower-class characters use more NSE than those from higher classes. The possible motives on using NSE include environment, poverty and education, as well as solidarity. The possible motive on using SE is politeness.
