Furthermore, the examination of Liz's pursuits as an emancipatory feminist demonstrates her resolve to question traditional thinking and reshape her own route to self-actualization.

While *Eat*, *Pray*, *Love* may not explicitly present itself as a feminist text, Liz Gilbert's journey can be interpreted through a feminist lens, as it embodies themes of self-discovery including empowerment and the pursuit of personal fulfilment beyond traditional gender norms. *Eat Pray Love* delves into themes of self-discovery including spiritual exploration, and the pursuit of happiness through Liz's transformative journey across different countries

and cultures. As she learns to embrace her own identity, connect with her spirituality, and prioritise her happiness, Liz discovers a newfound sense of purpose and fulfilment in life.

The most prominent intrinsic element in *Eat, Pray, Love* is shown when the main major character faces conflicts.
